### Winter warmth on our streets

When did you last try and strike up conversation with a stranger? No ulterior motives, no hidden agendas – just friendliness for the sake of being friendly. Walking around wearing a clerical collar wishing people 'Good morning' or 'Good afternoon' provokes every kind of reaction, from a full scale conversation to the kind of backlash famously described by Hobbes as 'nasty, brutish and short'. Those latter engagements reveal a frame of mind that cannot be countered.

On reflection, I can count on one hand the number of conversations I've had in public prompted by nothing more than a sense of disinterested friendliness. When did you last see two total strangers having a good chinwag about art, politics or even EastEnders, simply for the sake of being friendly?

In other countries around the world such exchanges are commonplace. So what is it that makes us different? The socially suffocating 'mind your own business – don't talk to me' culture currently pervading our country can only be got rid of if we're prepared to take a collective chance and let our public guard down.

I sometimes wonder at the thoughts of people when turning the occasional blind eye or deaf ear to a well-meaning Vicar who dared to acknowledge them passing by. Have they had a particularly bad day? Are their minds elsewhere? You're never quite sure what reaction you're going to get to a friendly salutation – a sad face can break into a wide smile; a pacific look can collapse into a frown.



Affable *bonhomie* never hurt anyone – I'm convinced that it can actually make the difference between having a good day and a bad one. The shared smile in the street, the conversation on the train or the snatch of laughter at the bus stop – these are things which enrich our lives, however ephemeral they might be.

If we can replace surly sangfroid with affable openness, then that's half the battle won. Man is, by his very nature, a social animal – the summits of human progress have all been scaled by cohesive interaction – not voluntary ostracism, inscrutable seclusion or a frosty attitude. We forget that at our peril.
