Special Treat at Soundbites Festive Finale

Did you know that one of the world's most famous Christmas hymns has a Hertfordshire connection?

Adeste Fideles, or "Oh Come all Ye Faithful" as we know it today, is a carol close to our hearts at St Edmund's College.

On Wednesday 3rd December the Headmaster of St Edmund's College, Paulo Durán, proudly took the original manuscript written by John Francis Wade, whilst studying at the English College, Douay, to All Saints Church, Hertford to be displayed throughout a Christmas concert performed by our orchestra.



The College's orchestra was invited to play at the festive finale concert of the Soundbites series. The performance started with a sparkling concert overture of traditional Christmas songs composed by Leroy Anderson before the audience joined the orchestra in singing Adeste

Fideles with the manuscript proudly on display.

The concert also included Kathryn Salter Kaye and Michael Stephen Jones playing a suite from The Snowman, pieces from the Nutcracker, the Hallelujah chorus and the concert culminated in the a toe tapping rendition of Sleigh Ride.

Through donations from the audience, we are pleased to be able to donate £180 to the Teenage Cancer Trust. The church also raised £500 for the All Saints' Music Development Fund.

“A penny for them...”

Our thoughts often seem quite random, even unconnected. Things come into our minds we are not expecting, and sometimes these thoughts are unwanted, sometimes just irritating. At other times, they are repetitive and intrusive – we just want to be rid of them.

We also have creative thoughts giving us ideas for projects, plans for the future, ideas for holidays, solving problems, finding solutions for remedying difficult relationships. There are so many ways of thinking. We tend to feel our best thoughts are the ones we control and develop; the worst seem uncontrollable and intrusive.

I am sure there are occasions when God plants thoughts in our minds. People pop into our thoughts. National and international situations come to the fore. I believe that this can become a way of praying. We do not have to get down on our knees to pray (although this can be a good discipline.)

The next time a person or some situation comes into your mind, try presenting that person or situation to God. Ask God to be in that place, to come alongside that person.

There are times when we realise we should be taking action, or become involved ourselves – God answering our prayer through our own activity.

Our thoughts are not always serious. God loves it when we say thank you however briefly. When our spirits soar in beautiful countryside, or when listening to wonderful music, thank God!



This is what we do in our Prayer Group. We don't spend an hour on our knees. We mention people and situations that concern us, believing that God is with us as we speak, and then those people and things are presented to God. We sometimes use music, pictures or objects based on a theme or passage of Scripture to help focus our minds.

We would love more people to join us, just for one hour at 10.30 am on the third Tuesday of the month. We meet at my home, 1 St Johns Court, St Johns Street (opposite the Catholic Church.) Coffee or tea is served at the end for those able to stay a little longer. Come and join us – Pause for Thought!

We say we care about the poor and vulnerable, particularly in the global south, we say we care about our children's and grandchildren's futures, we say we care about our local environment, and yet we continue to ignore the warnings of 98 percent of the world's scientists that global warming and climate change are happening.
