VICAR'S VIEWPOINT

Truly serving God



Dear Friends,

I remember "Jim'll fix it" on TV – he used his influence to gain all sorts of special treats for children. If I ever felt a tinge of jealousy when other youngsters got their heart's desire, I do so no longer. I also remember when cycling was an innocent pastime and there was a sense of fair play in sport.

Recently we have seen how Sir Jimmy Savile and Mr Lance Armstrong have both used their position to further their own ends. Each used charitable work to disguise the way in which they were either causing damage to vulnerable young people or gaining an unfair edge over opponents to win prizes and boost his status.

These are truly disgraceful situations, and it is important that they are exposed and lessons learnt. Perhaps then healing can begin for Savile's victims who have lived with this for decades, and in a lesser way greater vigilance can be exercised over sport and drugs. In Savile's case, it is very disappointing that this could not have come out while he was still alive.

Meanwhile, the trial continues in The Hague of Radovan Karadzic who committed yet worse crimes of genocide but his defence has been that he should be rewarded for "reducing suffering" and had sought peace in Bosnia! The ability of humans to disguise the truth, possibly even to themselves, is remarkable.

Does charitable work for disabled and disadvantaged people or for a cancer foundation or violence perpetrated in the cause of "peace" justify other actions? Surely not. For ultimately the goal of these people has been their own self-

aggrandisement. Christians understand this to be about human sin, something which may be extremely pronounced in some people, especially faced with particular opportunities or crises, but we are all in danger of justifying ourselves and disregarding our failures.

Tragically we must acknowledge, of course, that there have been shocking failures even among people of faith. We all have mixed motives for what we do, and we should not pretend otherwise. Christianity calls us regularly to bring our lives back to God, to let his light shine into us so that we can bring light to others. This is about humility, recognising that God can and will work through us, and when we allow him to work there will be good outcomes. If we are driven by a proud and arrogant self-seeking, we wander far from God.

No wonder many of our hymns have strong imagery of fighting and overcoming, but this is about the power of the spiritual battle within. There are powerful feelings and influences at work in our lives, and the fact that we cannot always control them is why many people seek counselling or psychotherapy (there may be other reasons, of course). In the Gospels we often see Jesus praying and working against the forces of evil which afflict and oppress people. Today we still need the strength of God to hold and guide us, to enable us to turn from sin and live in the light of God's love.

To acknowledge our need of God is far from being a weakness, but a means to find a truer humility, so that rather than seeking our own ends and meeting our own needs we will be serving God. As the great prayer of Ignatius of Loyola says: "Teach us, good

Lord, to serve you as you deserve; to give and not to count the cost; to fight and not to heed the wounds; to toil and not to seek for rest; to labour and not to ask for any reward, save that of knowing that we do your will."
