VICAR'S VIEWPOINT

Back to.....

Dear Friends,

"Back to School" has been the strapline which we have read in our shops since the beginning of the holidays in July.

I always feel that it is a bit much for children and teachers who have only just begun their holidays to be faced with "Back to School" in huge letters but the shops have stocked up on uniform, shoes, stationary, books and bags that they want to encourage us to buy so that we are well prepared, although, as a Mum I always bought trousers and shoes just at the end of the holidays as inevitably the children had grown even over just six weeks (I blame the Dutch genes for the large size!).

However, the time has come now and it is back to school or back to work or back to reality for most of us in September.

'Back to.....' what does this mean for you? It seems to suggest a fresh start: the new term, planning, new books: a certain familiar routine: a sense of tradition and even comfort in the known, like returning home from holidays. 'East, West, home best (Oost West Thuis Best)' the brass plaque said on my Dutch grandmother's house.

There is also often that sense of hope and future in the phrase 'back to' as well, as we think of our resolutions such as 'this time I'll try harder', 'I will sort things out', 'I will turn over a new leaf'.

We can give this very real gift of hope, comfort, and fresh start to others as we all participate in the Church's Back to Church campaign. All of us know someone that we can invite to come with us to Church and experience afresh the love of God shared in



our worship. All of us can invite someone to this service on September 30th at 10.00am. It would be ideal to ask them face to face and hand them the invitation card which we will be giving out over the next few weeks but if we feel particularly shy then we can fill the card in and pop it through their letter box and ensure that we look out for them when they come on the Sunday.

This campaign will only work if we all participate in it and ensure that everyone feels welcomes and comfortable. It will be also be great if you have any suggestions about how we might ensure that Back to Church Sunday goes well.

The very idea of going back to Church can be profoundly meaningful for all of us whether we have been attending church for years or whether we are new. Back to God's love, to be reminded of God's forgiveness, to learn how to live our lives, to the words of the Bible, the traditions the uplifting music the friendly fellowship and back to the ultimate comfort of being at one with God through sacrament, prayer and praise.

Back to Church Sunday 30th September. I am looking forward to celebrating this together with you and your friends.

The Kempe Window A Gift Day Sunday October 7th



One of the most striking features of All Saints is our wonderful East Window. It was created by the famous stained glass artist CE Kempe, with his trademark wheat sheaf found in one corner. Its theme is the Vine based on John 15: 5: *I am the true vine, you are the branches*. We see the Vine in the central pane with Christ crucified reigning in glory. The branches of the vine, spreading out from the cross, contain some of the saints.

Our quinquennial survey conducted by an architect earlier this year found that there



was a real danger of the window breaking up and collapsing and so we are having it reset, pane by pane and have had to have scaffolding on both sides, inside and outside the Church to enable the work people to complete this process.

As you can imagine this will be very expensive and we have had an estimate of about £7,000 - £8,000! Many of you have already kindly made donations towards the window but we still need to raise a considerable amount. We propose to have a gift day on Sunday 7th October. It is also Harvest Festival. After the service with its usual donations of food which will keep for Harlow Foodbank and cash donations for the Bishop of St Alban's Water Aid appeal, a table will be set up in Church to receive gifts for the Stained Glass restoration appeal at Coffee Time.

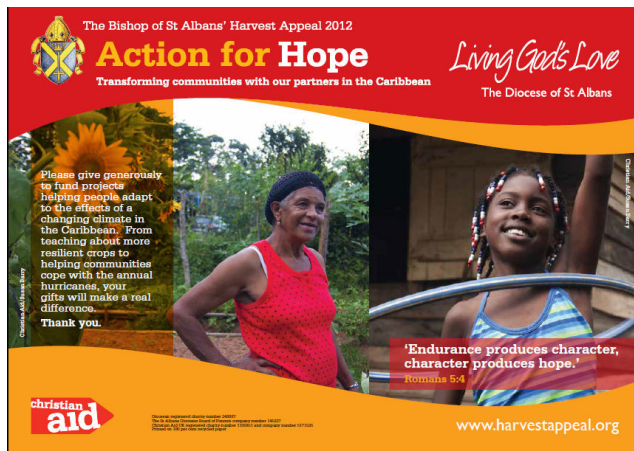

Harvest Thanksgiving

Once again, on Sunday 7th October at our Harvest Festival the loose collection will be given to the Bishop of St Albans' Water Aid Appeal, a project run through Christian Aid to bring water and wells to villages that have no access to fresh water.
