Strength for the struggles ...

Dear Friends,

I feel it is important to keep in touch with the news, don't you?

We do need to know what is happening in the world around us, but it can come at a cost. Sometimes you could almost feel that ignorance would be better, since there are so many challenging situations across the world as well as issues in our own land. Of course, ignorance is not the bliss that the saying suggests, and we do need to live and pray in the world as it is.

Conflict seems to be the main news item these days, from the massive global uncertainties to local disagreements. I find it intriguing that so often with voting nations are often finely balanced between two options. You might imagine that a clearer way forward, acceptable to most if not all people, would eventually emerge, but that seems extremely rare. And sadly in numerous situations groups turn to violence rather than reason to further their aims.

Conflict is very much part of the Passion Story of Jesus. He is in a historical situation where there has been war, violence and ongoing terrorist activity. People are living on a knife-edge and a message of love and peace sounds very idealistic, as ever. Speaking words of love and reconciliation will not appeal to some groups, and Jesus' ministry leads him into many confrontations.

Finally it demands his life, and he remains true to his ideals - and pays the price. It is, however, something that he expected, though he did not welcome it. He knew that he had to sacrifice himself to make peace for our sinful humanity, setting us right with God.

The conflict can also take place within us, as represented in the temptation story that we will hear as Lent begins.

Jesus does have to wrestle with the option of taking the wrong path. We too have a battle for the soul in a world that can impact on us in many ways to pull us away from serving God. If Jesus, the Son of God, struggled, we are likely to struggle yet more as our resistance will inevitably be lower.

Lent is a time of facing up to the hard and harsh aspects of the world and our own inner conflicts and staying close to Jesus.

Jesus and his love will never change, but as the world changes and our lives with it, we need to come to him regularly to strengthen us in living out daily his will of peace and love.

May the God of Peace bless and keep you.
