**Archbishop Justin's
'Thought for the Day'
Broadcast on Radio 4 24/2/2022**

To wake up to the news of war is terrible.

To wake up to its reality is orders of magnitude worse.

Shakespeare refers to war as chaos - the loosing of the dogs of war - and calls for one of his characters to cry out the warning about what it means.

Those in the Ukraine will be thinking about their relatives on the front lines, or the friends on the front lines. We are thinking, where is it going to go next? Politicians are thinking, what do we do?

In all of the thinking, in all of the responses, there is the great uncertainty which is the worst enemy of good decisions. Uncertainty leads to fear, fear leads to overreaction.

How do we react well? How do politicians in the cloud of war, not really knowing what's going on, but knowing they have no opportunity to wait – how do they make up their minds?

They will rightly call for all of us, and for themselves, to have resolution, courage, determination, a willingness to sacrifice whatever is necessary in order to ensure that peace may come and justice may be done.

Peace and justice. They often seem to contrast, and yet they are opposite sides of the same coin.

We seek peace and justice, and that must end with those involved in conflict not having solutions imposed on them but finding for themselves the way forward to reconciliation and peace.

Right at the end of his life, Jesus Christ, on the eve of his crucifixion, spoke to his disciples and he said something very memorable. 'In the world you will have trouble, but do not be afraid, I have overcome the world.'

For me and for many of faith, the great certainty in the world, the only certainty, is that we know that God does not change. Let us find our resolution, our peace, our certainty not by screwing up our courage, but in the knowledge of the eternal arms that hold us.

May God be with those who suffer today.

"O come, let us return to the Lord"

Hosea 6.1

Dear Friends,

The pandemic which has kept us apart and caused so much pain and loneliness has abated, and all restrictions are now officially over. This is great news after two years of such tough restrictions and so much suffering (although we are still warned to exercise personal responsibility). Along with so many rules, there have been long periods when we were forbidden to go to church – technically I was not allowed to enter even as the Vicar. And, at times, no funerals and no weddings; in fact – nothing.

Hosea's words come from a time when the people of Israel had been removed from their land, following much destruction and violence, forced to live in exile. They felt alienated, lamenting in psalm 137 "How can we sing the Lord's praise in a strange land?"

Yet they never lost the vision of remembering their true identity. Now they were returning home, and this also meant a return to the worship and service of the Lord. They heard it as such good news, rightly, and although they felt their exile was in many ways a punishment for their sins, they knew that they would be restored and healed.

Our experience of isolation and shock is not unlike the exile, yet hopefully we have remembered to care, to pray, to love. With the pandemic over, we are encouraged to "Return to the Lord" as the faithful have so often needed to do. The need to return can be due to harsh circumstances, or perhaps our own struggle with faith in these troubled times. Yet to feel once again fully part of God's people we need the company of other faithful Christians, to feel the strength of prayer shared, of worship offered. This Lent we will be focusing clearly on the need to return to the Lord.

This is for all of us – for Lent is the time for preparation for Easter and on Ash Wednesday, as the Lenten journey begins – we are reminded that Lent was originally embraced as a time for those preparing for

Baptism or Confirmation and as an opportunity for those who had been absent or even excluded from the Church's fellowship. We now see it as a time for growing in faith and in challenging ourselves to turn away from sin and follow Christ.

This year, I hope that it may be a special time of looking at our relationships and lifestyle, and in our willingness to grow in faith by making a decision to Return to the Lord "who will bind us up and heal us" as Hosea says. For in Christ we know that God is forgiving and welcoming, and he will go to the extremes to show us the depth of his love.



LiveLent: Embracing Justice



is the Church of England's theme for Lent 2022. Both the Archbishop of Canterbury's 2022 Lent Book, *Embracing Justice*, and the daily reflections booklet for adults (CHP) have been written by Isabelle Hamley.


It invites us to examine our own lives truthfully, to see the world more deeply and to pray – for the church and the world far and near – that 'justice may roll down like waters, and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream' (Amos 5.24). Each week we follow a different thread through the many stories of justice in the Bible to explore how God works with humanity to bring justice, wholeness and salvation to all.

- There is free online support for groups studying the book – including in-depth interviews with Dr Selina Stone, Bishop Michael Curry, Ruth Valerio and others exploring different aspects of justice.
- The Big Church Read is also offering free downloadable discussion questions and short video introductions for each week from Isabelle Hamley.

As in recent years, the weekly themes of the Archbishop's Lent Book are also explored in daily reflection from the Church of England.

#LiveLent: Embracing Justice offers a daily Bible reading, a short reflection and a prayer, as well as a practical challenge linked to the week's theme. An accompanying child's version is also available to help children and their families explore how we can live well together.

The book and booklets will be accompanied by daily social media posts from Ash Wednesday to Easter Day, together with a wide range of free digital resources for individuals, groups and churches.



In the UK, nearly 400,000 children don't have a book of their own. Having access to books and developing a love of reading for pleasure is vital for a child's future.

World Book Day (3rd March 2022) offers every child and young person the opportunity to have a book of their own.

The scheme works by giving every child a £1 Book Token that matches a specially chosen set of books available in every bookshop that accepts Book Tokens. In the Hertford area that includes WH Smiths, Leaf (8 Old Cross), The Book Nook (Ware) & Waterstones (WGC). Asda, Morrisons, Sainsbury's and Tesco all stock the special books too.

Aschiana

We all enjoy produce from Fiona's stall each Sunday and are grateful to her for the hard work she puts into it week after week, but also for her commitment to helping others with the proceeds.



Currently she is supporting Aschiana, an Afghan run NGO for street children in Kabul. She and John were both formerly trustees, and she now continues that work. Recent news from Aschiana is encouraging in some respects - even in Afghanistan there is some cause for hope and joy, as can be seen from the following:

- The girls are attending the basic education programmes regularly
- Since Aschiana teaches very young girls, the Taliban say this is permitted

- Only women are allowed to teach girls, so Aschiana's female teachers have been coming in to work
- Boys and girls are now in separate classrooms but at least they are at school

Peregrine Falcons

The peregrine falcons have been seen flying above the tower, and it is probable that they will nest and raise young there in a specially installed nesting platform.



A team of people has put in many hours to install a webcam so that if there are chicks, we will be able to watch their activities from below. We would like to thank Richard Toyn, Barry Trevis, Peter Finney, Brian Dilley and Russell Savory for their time and expertise. In addition we had a generous grant from the Kiln Family Trust, for which we are very grateful.

A Walk around All Saints Churchyard.



As the days get longer and the weather improves there is so much to see in All Saints massive Churchyard. There are the amazing drifts of white snowdrops under the towering trees, then the yellow aconites, followed by purple crocuses, wild primroses and daffodils.



The churchyard has an extraordinary variety of plant and animal wildlife. In a count last summer, 20 species of tree, 54 different wild flowers, 6 species of butterfly and 16 different birds were identified.

The peregrine falcons are often to be seen high up on the tower (see above). We hope the nesting boxes for swifts will be occupied later in the year

Displays around the churchyard are regularly mounted, the current one representing Hope and Joy. Please come and wander around in the tranquility of this sacred space.

All Saints Finance

2021 was tough for everyone including our church. Whilst some costs could be trimmed during the pandemic (mainly utilities) others could not be.

Of course, our income took a big hit by the loss of events and hall income. Overall, we had an operating deficit of £18,603 for 2021. Coupled with the loss of £17,072 in 2020 we have had to cope with deficits totalling over £35,000. Given that coming into the pandemic our opening general reserves were less than £29,000, this

has meant taking extraordinary steps to protect the church operationally.

The first thing we did in 2021 was to critically examine our special funds held for St Johns Hall, the Memorial, Fabric and Organ funds. We were able to release £20,000 from these to bolster our general operating funds.

In addition, in July we held a special gift day which raised over £24,000. We are really grateful that our members responded to this request so generously.

Finally in the last couple of months we were able to restart Soundbites and received considerable support from our regular hirers, with the Phoenix Big Band, Hertford Choral Society and Simon Balle school all donating to the church the entire proceeds of their concerts. This meant that we turned a surplus overall, so that our general funds coming into 2022 have been more than restored.

Recently our Memorial Fund has been bolstered by a legacy from our friend, the late Lynford Neville and now stands at £59,000, the income from which comes to our general funds.

The prospects for 2022 are not particularly good, principally because of inflation, in particular the cost of heating and lighting the church and loss of income from our legacy Cull Heating Fund (our 4% GUK Govt stock is being redeemed and future investment income from this fund will be greatly reduced).

In addition, we have lost some loyal members through ill health and, indeed death, which will have quite an impact on our regular donations. In January we lost over £3,000 so we have a lot to do in the rest of the year as the hall gets back to normal and events can be planned.

It is clear that we will still struggle to break even operationally, and we have a structural deficit. Given that we cannot easily reduce costs, we have to find a way of increasing our regular income. We all have to be focussed on achieving medium term sustainability if we are to remain at the centre of the church's mission in Hertford.
