The Platinum Anniversary celebrations remind us of the sheer dedication of Queen Elizabeth II. 


This bank holiday outdoor concert is part of Hertford Town Council's Castle Open Day marking the Jubilee between 12 noon and 4pm.





## Michael Stephens-Jones 26<sup>th</sup> June

#### The Swifts Return

Like many others I have spent the last couple of days with my eyes trained

upwards, hoping for my first sighting of a returning swift. Each year the beginning of May marks the end of their long migration from Africa, and each year I wait anxiously for a first sight of their safe return. And then, yesterday morning, I was rewarded with a sudden swooping flash past my window, the dark curve of their wings joyful against the blue spring sky.

In this country our relationship with birds is complicated. Millions of us tune into Springwatch, and we spend more than twice as much on bird food as the rest of Europe put together. But we also tear down hedgerows, net our buildings, and make liberal use of pesticides. Last week the BBC reported on a 75 year-long study of Great Tits which found that the changing climate has pushed egg-laying up to three weeks earlier than usual. Birds are considered a good indicator of the state of wildlife in the UK, and their numbers have consistently declined over the last half century. As our ability to manage our environments increases, we are remaking the

world in our own image. We can look around us and see where humans have intervened to protect and sustain ecologies, and where humans have intervened for the benefit of a few powerful people. When the world feels like it's growing more chaotic and the future feels threatened, it is easy to give up investing in the fates of these other creatures – to see them as insignificant, or even a barrier to our own flourishing.

Last Sunday was the feast day of Julian of Norwich, a 14th century mystic who lived through hunger and plague, political upheaval and violence, and personal suffering. A woman who wrote in the vernacular, her life was insignificant in the hierarchy of the Church. But during an illness which brought her close to death, she had a series of visions about the love of God for creation. In perhaps the most famous of those visions, she sees a tiny thing in the palm of her hand, the size of a hazelnut. She is told that this tiny thing is everything that is made. Julian is astonished that something so small could keep on existing. But then comes the response: it lives, and will keep living, because God loves it. Julian sees that littleness and fragility are not at odds with ultimate significance. As the sky fills with swifts returning for another spring, I am reminded that it is not foolish to delight in these little creatures. Perhaps in doing so we might learn to love the world as though it is not ours to control.

#### **Produce Stall Report**

(Due to a miscommunication, this report for the 2022 APCM was not included in the report pack. It is now also available at https://www.allsaintshertford.org/apcm.php)

I would like to say a huge THANK YOU to all those faithful customers of the Produce Stall who return week after week on Sunday, or at Soundbites on Wednesday to buy my homemade jams, marmalade and chutney, or bird food, fruits in season, fresh eggs (courtesy of the Rescue hens!), plants, flowers and apple juice. The following is what you have helped to achieve.

In the last year we have had two major, worldshattering emergencies/crises - the return of the Taliban to power in Afghanistan and the invasion of Ukraine by Putin's forces. This has dictated the destination for money raised, following three months in aid of All Saints.

From 2/5/21 - 29/8/21 the Produce Stall was in aid of All Saints, and raised a total of £483.95.

From 5/9/21 - 27/2/22, following the takeover by the Taliban, I shifted the Produce Stall proceeds to go to Aschiana, which raised a total of £1,229.70. This included the sale of Indian masks brought over from Mombai at Christmas by my granddauahter Chloe.

From 2/3/22 - 3/4/22 (and ongoing) the Produce Stall has been in aid of Ukraine, raising £857 so far. (Another £240 was raised by 8/5/22, making £1,097 in total to date for Ukraine).

Some of the money taken through the Stall has been donations rather than sales. The figures for Aschiana and for Ukraine show the measure of concern among people for worldwide disasters..

In Kabul, Aschiana is still teaching boys and young girls, but in common with the rest of the country they are not allowed to teach older girls. Female teachers have been allowed to teach however - for now. Aschiana is also working in the IDP camps.

In addition to Sunday mornings, the Produce Stall raises funds at coffee mornings etc. which go straight into the capable hands of Colin Bird and his allies!

So, again, a huge, huge THANK YOU, and please - keep it up!

#### Republic of Conscience

Some people want things to change; some want things to go back to how they once were; others want things to stay exactly the same. The push and pull of these differing desires can now be felt right around the world; often they lead to terrible consequences, but sometimes they strike us with flashes of hope.

I thought this as Sinn Fein became the largest party in the Northern Ireland Assembly for the first time in history. I grew up with a step-father in the British Army, who did several tours of duty at the height of The Troubles. For me Sinn Fein was a name to be feared, like the IRA. I associated it with Armalite rifles and Semtex and imagined it to be an existential threat to me and my family.

To see Michelle O'Neill rise to become the nominee for Northern Ireland's First Minister shows how much things have changed since I was boy. A situation that once seemed, to my mind, forever stuck in endless intransigence has - to quote W.B. Yeats - 'All changed; changed utterly.'

'Don't be scared,' O'Neill said in her winning speech. Acknowledging a fear of change and what this electoral victory might mean to people bitterly opposed to what she stands for. When she said the result presented the Irish people with an opportunity to 'reimagine relationships in this society' it was a good choice of words.

Imagination – or the mind – is where the struggle to make things better between people happens. In his poem, 'From The Republic Of Conscience', Seamus Heaney describes this territory as that universal place where a person finds it hard to avoid self-examination.

What do you do when your enemies make the journey from violence to peace and demonstrate a transformation? Do you have to change, too? And is that just? We might say we prefer reconciliation to strife, but sometimes holding a grievance is easier than


letting it go. Especially when you have personally suffered loss and injustice.

When Solomon wrote the proverb: 'It is to a person's credit to pass by an offence', he was recognising that reconciliation is impossible if it is conditional on our offences forever being held against us. As hard as it is, forgiving digs us out of entrenched positions.

A mind is perhaps the toughest thing in the world to change. But it is where change has to take place if wider societal transformation is to happen. It often requires going against our instincts. As St. Paul wrote, 'Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed in the renewing of your mind.'

Sometimes it takes the next generation to bring about a renewal. One that can acknowledge the past, re-think the present and better imagine a future.
