Dear friends,

I would like to wish you all joy as Christmas approaches, and I hope that you will be able to celebrate the birth of the Christ-child with us at All Saints.

As I write this just after the Autumn Statement, where our nation has officially gone into recession and a set of tax rises and spending cuts is to be imposed. It's a gloomy situation for most of us, especially with increasing energy bills plus wider concerns about the war in Ukraine and global warming at a time when the human population has risen to 8 billion people, all with their need of homes, food, care and security.

For several months there have been concerns about how Christmas will feel this year. We were told there is likely to be a shortage of turkeys and currently there is a shortage of eggs for our cakes. Happily, there are ways round this, eating other things - if this doesn't sound too Marie Antoinette! There is also the likelihood that many people will cut down on presents this year, and this won't help the economy recover. It seems also that many of the amazing light displays which people put on will not be possible due to energy costs, with some of those having been made to elicit funds for special charities. It's interesting that many of the people raising charitable funding in this way are themselves people with quite limited resources.

If this is all so, where will we find the joy? It's comparatively easy to rejoice when things are going well, more of a challenge in harsher circumstances. I feel that joy comes from relatedness, of meeting with others and valuing one another – of showing how much we care even if we aren't offering large gifts. This basic need of relatedness was made truly obvious during the pandemic when we were forbidden to meet, for it was the people themselves which we truly missed, wasn't it? Joy is being with others whether in the community, in the family or in church.



Christmas Joy emanates from the birth of Christ the Saviour. No wonder we refer to him as light in the darkness. We need that light more than ever, for our world and for ourselves. His light in our lives and in our community cannot be switched off by an energy crisis. The wonder of God's presence among humankind is to be celebrated, and we sing carols and hymns in thankfulness and joy. We also pray for the world around us where there is so much suffering.

I invite you, then, not to escapism but to an experience of joy in the face of the sad state of the world. Jesus came to bring us hope and peace, which we feel in our own lives when we know him as our Lord, and which we share in this needy world.

New Bishop of Hertford



Downing Street announced on Thursday 24th November that the Venerable Jane Mainwaring is to be the next Bishop of Hertford in the Diocese of St Albans. She is currently the Archdeacon of St Albans, a post she has held since March 2020.

Although Jane has spent much of her ministry in the Diocese of St Albans – as Archdeacon, a parish priest, and a rural dean – she served her curacy in Suffolk having trained for ministry on the East Anglia Ministerial Training Course.

Having grown up in London and Essex, Jane studied Theology and Religious Studies at Leeds University. She has worked for the Diocese of Southwark's retreat centre (while volunteering in a large church youth group in Surrey), and for the YWCA in Coventry, helping young adults move on from emergency accommodation.

Jane studied at Trinity College, Carmarthen (part of the University of Wales), researching in Church of England and Church in Wales Primary schools, whilst also being Chaplaincy Assistant, working with and supporting the students who attended the college chapel. Jane was Curate at St Gregory's, Sudbury in the Diocese of St Edmundsbury and Ipswich from 2000 before moving to the Diocese of St Albans to be Team Vicar of St Mark's, Hitchin in 2003. She additionally served as Rural Dean of Hitchin from 2015 before becoming Archdeacon of St Albans in 2020.

While working at St Mark's, Hitchin, Jane married her husband, James, a professional woodwind musician. They have two children, Elliot (17) and Amelie (14). Jane says that music "feeds my heart and soul". She loves musicals – James plays in them – and her household is constantly full of music, as her children also engage with music in different and varied ways. Beside her love of musicals, Jane enjoys being by the sea, swimming and spending time with her friends and family.

The Bishop of St Albans, the Rt Revd Alan Smith, welcomed the announcement, saying:

"I am thrilled that Jane Mainwaring is going to be the next Bishop of Hertford. She is already well known within the Diocese, having served here as a parish priest, rural dean and archdeacon. Her deep faith and pastoral heart have endeared her to those with whom she has worked, and I have no doubt she will be a superb bishop. Please pray for her, James, Elliot and Amelie as they prepare for their move to Knebworth and Jane's consecration, which we hope will be on Thursday 2 February 2023."

Commenting on the news of her appointment, the Ven Jane Mainwaring said:

"Hertfordshire having been my home for the last 20 years, I couldn't be more honoured and humbled to be given the opportunity to continue to serve the churches, schools, chaplaincies and communities of this county in this new capacity. I look forward to deepening existing relationships and establishing new ones, as we seek to share God's love and hope together."

The Ven Jane Mainwaring will become a bishop on 2 February 2023 (details to be confirmed in due course).

She will be formally welcomed to the Diocese as Bishop in a service in All Saints on Saturday February 4th at 16.00.

The search for a new Archdeacon of St Albans will begin before Christmas.

Produce Stall/Ukraine

Recently the Produce Stall has been in aid of ALFS, getting specific items to specific people/organisations in Ukraine, arranged by Tina Banks (13A Queen's Road). A huge thank you to all of you who have contributed

through the Stall, it has enabled us to buy them a generator! And a supply of water purification tablets. Both of them such important items.



Tina was in Ukraine last week, and this is the list of items she knows are needed in the areas she is targeting. Conditions are worse than they were in August when she was last there, prices are sky high, food is scarce. Electricity is 'on' only from 4 - 8 pm, (now even less) so people are living in the cold and dark. There are more stray dogs and cats....

The larger charities seem to target refugee centres. ALFS' help is targeted to specific needs. The area is still getting bombed. Schoolchildren live largely underground, in the dark. The next artic. Is leaving on 5th December, hopefully taking 20 pallet loads again.

General needs - Generators (£300-350) diesel is available for them. Essential for medical facilities etc. Thick sweaters and coats, hats, scarves, gloves. Sleeping bags, tents, blankets. 'Camel packs' for soldiers. products, Nappies, sanitary toiletries. deodorant, shampoo, liquid soap, tooth brushes and toothpaste. Torches and batteries. Thermal underwear.

Food – dry pasta, rice, tins of anything. Tea, coffee, chocolates and sweets, biscuits.

Out of date medicines, dressings etc. Torches, batteries, wind-up torches (Tesco). Art materials.

Hand warmers, hot water bottles, candles, water purifying tablets

Ambulance – for getting injured soldiers back from the front line – money. St. Mary's Welwyn are putting on a pantomime, this next week to raise funds for this. It needs to be a 4x4. Shoe Boxes – for war widows and their children, who have lost husband, Dad, home. Tina's suggested items are toiletries, liquid soap, shampoo, toothbrushes and toothpaste, deodorant. Sweets and chocolate. Pencil case and art materials, stickers, exercise books. A Teddy. Torch, batteries, wind-up torch (Tesco's do a cheap one).

Items can be delivered to Tina, at 13A Queen's Road, just opposite Hale Road, very close to the church.



A Torn Safety Net:

How the cost-of-living crisis threatens its own last line of defence

Christian think-tank Theos have published a report on the effect the cost-of-living crisis has had on social and economic security.



"While the cost-of-living crisis has made life acutely less secure for many people, this level of chronic insecurity has been growing over the longer term. The collective impact of household insecurity is beginning to show in whole communities. It is no longer a crisis only of individual circumstances, but a systemic problem, reflected in the fraying fabric of civil society and faith groups. These institutions form a vital part of the safety net offering security and material support to millions of people but are themselves becoming less secure. There is a risk that churches and other faith aroups will close, not because of falling attendance or religious affiliation, but because they cannot afford to keep the lights on."

Warm Spaces

Millions of people in touch with church community

More than seven million people have had contact with their local church for community support services such as food banks, parent toddler groups and lunch clubs, new figures published this month suggest.

Polling by Savanta ComRes for the Church of England shows that nearly half the population reports having been in contact with their local church – at 46% - with the most popular reasons for doing so being attending weddings, baptisms, and funerals (50%) worship and services (42%) and carol services (39%).

But the figures also show that 30% of those in contact with their local church – or 13.7% of all UK adults – have done so through community services such as a parent toddler groups, lunch clubs and food banks.

The figures also show that twice as many agree (47%) as disagree (23%) that the local church is an important part of their community and just over a half (52%) agree that the Church is an important part of British society.

The findings come after Church of England statistics from 2019 show its churches running or supporting 35,000 social action projects.

This includes 8,000 food banks and more than 4,000 parent/carer toddler groups. More than 5,000 churches run or support lunch clubs, coffee mornings or similar hospitality for older people.

The Bishop of Durham, Paul Butler, who speaks for the bishops in the House of Lords on welfare issues, said: "These figures show the extent to which the Church of England is providing not just spiritual and pastoral support but practical help to communities throughout the country.

"Jesus's commandment to love your neighbour as yourself is evident in the care and service provided by churches in so many ways.

"The biggest source of practical support provided by Church of England currently is through running or supporting around 8,000 food banks throughout the country and many of our churches are now opening up as 'warm spaces' through the 'Warm Welcome' campaign, as people struggle to pay their energy bills.

"Sadly we anticipate that these services will come under increasing pressure this winter."

A very hard winter for many

The Bishop of St Albans, Alan Smith, convenor of the Bishops in the House of Lords, and the Bishop of Durham Paul Butler, who speaks on poverty issues in the Lords, have responded to the Chancellor of the Exchequer's Autumn statement.

They said: "It is heartening to hear the Chancellor single out the needs of the most vulnerable as a principle behind his Autumn Statement. We recognise that he has had to make some very difficult choices and will continue to pray for him and for the Government as they carry these weighty responsibilities on behalf of everyone.

"Ahead of today's statement one of our key concerns was to see benefits keep pace with inflation. So we welcome the Chancellor's commitment in this regard but continue to call for the end to the two-child limit on Universal Credit, which hits some of the poorest families hardest.

"This is going to be a very hard winter for many. Our churches, in communities across the country, are already reporting alarming rises in demand for foodbanks and other services which have become a lifeline.

"It is heart-breaking to hear of people who just a year ago were donating to foodbanks but are now using them themselves.

"Many of our churches are among the more than 3,700 public spaces which are opening up this winter as a Warm Space for people amid surging energy bills.

"While we recognise the intense economic pressures on this country, as the Chancellor acknowledges, it is a global situation and we will continue to hold the Government to its commitment to return to giving 0.7 per cent of national income on international development."



Vicar and Churchwarden Charity Fund

Presently, we have 7 old legacies from the 17^{th} and 19^{th} centuries, the income from which is to alleviate financial hardship for people in All Saints' orbit. The yearly income amounts to about £350.00 and this is available to the Vicar

to help individuals in need, for instance visitors to the vicarage who need emergency help.

In recognition of the difficult circumstances facing a lot of people this winter, with raging inflation, especially energy costs, the PCC agreed to expand the charity account by encouraging donations from parishioners who may feel able to handle increased costs themselves but who might like to share what they have with others who may be struggling. Grants could then be given to individuals facing extraordinary need at this time. Grants will be available to be paid from donations, rather than donations being invested for income which is then distributed.

Individual needs will be considered by the Vicar and grants proposed by her to a panel comprising the church officers for agreement, and then administered by the Treasurer. Donations can be paid into All Saints Memorial Fund at NatWest Hertford, sort code 60-10-39, account number 07011113.

Christmas Hampers


