


Hope

As I was thinking about writing this message I looked out of the window and thought how Springlike everything looked. Flowers in bloom, birds flying around and singing lustily, blue sky and sun, everything showing promise and hope. Of course now that I have sat down to begin to write the sky has clouded over and the rain is falling.

How quickly things change. Of course this is true of life in general and why we can never afford to take anything for granted. I am not a great fan of making plans because so often over the years we have had to change them at the last minute. Sometimes this had proved to be challenging but at other times it has opened up new and interesting opportunities.

During this season of Lent I often think of Mary and how her life was constantly changing. As a young virgin she faced a momentous change when she found that she was to give birth to the son of God. Presumably then for some years she was a wife and mother. supporting her carpenter husband and bringing up her family. All this changed radically when Jesus started his ministry. She knew that he was special. At the wedding in Cana she told the stewards to do exactly what Jesus told them when the wine ran out. She had faith in him and knew that he would help. However, at the presentation in the Temple when Jesus was still a small baby being blessed by the elderly Simeon Mary had been warned:

"Behold, this child is appointed for the fall and rising of many in Israel, and for a sign that is opposed ³⁵ (and a sword will pierce through your own soul also), so that thoughts from many hearts may be revealed."



Surely this warning would have remained in her heart and she would have come to understand what it meant when Jesus was arrested, so cruelly flogged and then crucified. What mother would have not felt her soul being pierced by a sword at such a time. Mary, however, was not just any mother she was the one chosen to bring forth God into the world. She knew how different and how special Jesus was but also knew that God was in control. No matter how awful it must have been for her to witness Jesus dying in such a cruel manner I would like to think that Jesus' ministry had given her Hope.

Hope is something we all need and which sometimes we find particularly difficult. As we work our way through the dark days of Lent, surely we receive strength from the sure and certain hope of the resurrection. Many people these days shy away from religious funerals preferring instead to have a "celebration" or even perhaps a "simple cremation" with no mourners present. I have witnessed a number of these "celebrations" and come away feeling so sad because there was no hope of better things to come, no sense of the deceased having gone on to a better placeiust gone forever.

Jesus promised us that we would have life and have it in abundance. Surely that means we will have good times and bad times, so many different experiences. Just as the changing seasons of nature bring about a constant circle of life and death, good and bad even abundance and famine, so our own lives are constantly changing This needs to be celebrated, whilst we are still alive not just once someone has died.

A favourite Bible reading for funerals is John 14.1-6

Do not let your hearts be troubled. You believe in God; believe also in me. My Father's house has many rooms; if that were not so, would I have told you that I am going there to prepare a place for you? And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come back and take you to be with me that you also may be where I am.

This is the message of Hope and the message of Easter, the Resurrection promise. The Hope we all need and the promise that will not be broken.



Women of Holy Week

Women of Holy Week is a series of nine stories about nine different, but interlinked, women written by Paula Gooder, originally as Holy Week, Easter and Ascension Day reflections for Southwark Cathedral in 2021.

Starting with Palm Sunday and finishing with Ascension Day, these nine stories imagine what it might have been like to accompany Jesus in this final week of his life from the perspective of nine women.



Some of them we know with certainty were there because the Gospels tell us they were there: the widow with two coins, the woman with the ointment of pure nard, Mary wife of Clopas, Mary Magdalene, Mary mother of Jesus.

Some are not mentioned at all, but someone like them was probably present: a woman journeying to Jerusalem for the Passover, the wife of a scribe, and a female disciple at the Last Supper.

The stories also aim to travel from the outside in: from people who had the most fleeting encounters with Jesus at the start of the week to his most devoted followers at the end.

Daily Prayers for King Charles III



Thy Kingdom Come

The team are so excited to be back and well under way with planning for Thy Kingdom Come 2023, with some new changes ahead!

Through prayer and discernment, as Thy Kingdom Come goes into its 8th year, we are

introducing several significant changes, to bring new life and in response to the current context we live in.



The need across the world for the transforming power and mercy of God is more stark than ever. How can we partner with God, in prayer and mission, to see more people encounter the love of Christ this year?

Firstly, we have introduced new daily themes for our resources. These themes focus on the character of God - 'Our Father in Heaven' - the One to whom we are petitioning and inviting people to know, to love and to serve. To find out more about these themes click the button below.

Secondly, this year we're introducing a new sub-theme 'Living the Kingdom'. Whilst Thy Kingdom Come will always have its focus as a call to prayer for evangelisation we want to invite participants to go one step further.

Mission always comes from the place of prayer, so how can we in this time go the extra mile, empowered by the Holy Spirit, to love and serve those we are praying for or others who are in need? This is about living the Kingdom - individually and corporately - in our context.

Finally, returning to the early days of TKC, we are sensing a call for Christians to gather together (in-person where possible) and collaborate ecumenically locally, regionally and nationally - being a truly united witness to the world.

Ukraine

Tina Banks has just come back from her latest visit to Ukraine, taking another 20 palette loads of humanitarian aid raised from around Hertford. The purpose of her visits (this was

her third) is to see areas needing, and not getting, aid. Last week her Ukrainian contacts took her to the small town of Chernihiv, quite near the border with Belarus, so pretty much on the front line.

Chernihiv has recently been flattened by bombs, rockets and tanks. It has been devastated. The bridge was blown up. The school was targeted, and a hundred or so children were killed. (Some food was being cooked for the soldiers in the school kitchen, and it is suspected that an informer passed word to the Russians and so they targeted the school).



The surviving inhabitants of Chernihiv now live in what were 'weekend chalets' – like allotment summerhouses – without running water or electricity. Others live in 'shipping containers' – windowless metal boxes, with four bunk beds crammed in each, with an extreme condensation problem from lack of ventilation and the cold. With air raid sirens sounding regularly, children live in underground bunkers, in the dark – they are terrified.

Food is desperately scarce and expensive if you can find any, similarly, any aid. The aid

coming in from Poland, Italy and France seems to have dried up.

Tina is sending the next load at the end of the month (hopefully there will be monthly loads going into the future if she can get sufficient sponsorship for them) and she says there is a desperate need for FOOD, MEDICAL ITEMS, ADULT NAPPIES. A more detailed list follows. She is also hoping to send a load of Easter eggs/Easter bunnies to cheer the children! Meanwhile the Produce Stall at All Saints Church is in aid of this urgent work. Proceeds have already paid for an electric generator, so a big thank-you to all supporters.

In Chernihiv, as they finished distributing the first load of aid, a woman ran up, out of breath, distressed. When she heard that all the aid was distributed she burst into tears. She had nothing at all but what she stood up in. Maxim, a soldier helping, explained more aid should arrive next morning, and that she should come early. Tina's photo shows her delight. She actually did better by waiting a day, you can see her sleeping bag and the food and toiletries she was given.



A Latvian lady arrived here yesterday, to help in the garden for ten days (a Wwoofer). It is very sobering to hear from her of the fear in her country, Latvia, also Estonia, Lithuania and Poland, of what is happening in Ukraine, and what will happen next.....



LIST OF REQUESTS FROM UKRAINE

Clothes – men's, women's, children's, babies. Boots and trainers if nearly new. Sleeping bags, good quality blankets. Rucksacks if full size.

Food – packet soups, tinned meat, fish, pasta, rise, couscous, bulgar wheat, pasta sauce, tea, coffee, biscuits, porridge, pot noodles, baby food, instant anything foodwise.

Adult and baby nappies, sanitary products. Toothpaste, toothbrushes, deodorant, shower gel.

Power bank, generators, camping stoves and gas, torches, batteries, head torches, knee pads, tactical gloves, tourniquets.
Cough medicine, nasal sprays, cough and

cold remedies, throat lozenges, paracetamol, all and any medicines, dressings etc. (NB Unused, unfinished prescription medicines are given to doctors to administer appropriately).

Peregrine Falcons

A pair of Peregrine falcons seem to be taking up residence on our Tower Roof using the existing nest box.

They have been visiting occasionally since Friday 10th March – often only one, but on occasions two – with one watching whilst the other 'works' – housekeeping duties – removal of moss and re-arranging the gravel to create a depression.





Local Elections

The UK government has introduced a requirement for voters to show photo ID when voting at a polling station at elections. This new requirement will apply for the first time in England at the local elections on Thursday 4 May 2023.

Which forms of ID can I use to vote?

You can use any of the following:


- Passport
- Driving licence (including provisional license)
- Certain concessionary travel cards (this does not include Young Persons Rail or Bus Passes or Student ID)

- Identity card with PASS mark (Proof of Age Standards Scheme)
- Biometric immigration document
- Defence identity card
- Certain national identity cards

Please note: If you have a form of accepted ID that is out of date, you can still use it to vote at a polling station if it still looks like you.

If you don't already have an accepted form of photo ID, or you're not sure whether your photo ID still looks like you, you can apply for a free voter ID document, known as a Voter Authority Certificate.

You can apply for this at Voter Authority Certificate Application.



Alternatively, you can complete a paper application form and send this to the electoral services team at East Herts Council.
