All Saints' Welcomes Everyone



The feast of Pentecost, which we celebrated this year on 19th May, is one of most important festivals in the Christian calendar coming 50 days after Easter and 10 days after Ascension Day. Pentecost celebrates the day when the Holy spirit came down on the disciples, with tongues of fire. When they spoke about God, the crowds of people who had come from many distant lands were able to understand the disciples as though they were speaking in each of the listeners own language. This year at All Saints it also coincided with the Annual Civic Service when we welcomed Cllr Rachel Carter as the new Mayor of Hertford.

At a time when there is so much division in the world, and so much suspicion, wouldn't it be wonderful to live in a world where everybody understood what the other was saying. No misunderstanding, no confusion over meaning, just straight talking, treating one another with respect and even more importantly everybody really listening to what is being said.

We often feel these days that the world is getting smaller. Travel is far easier than it used to be, although we know that emissions from cars and planes are adding to the problems of global warming. When I was a child, admittedly quite a long time ago now, the only people who went to Australia were those who were emigrating to start a new life - you rarely heard of anybody coming back! Not only have I visited Australia (and come back) but I know many people who visit regularly to meet up with family or friends. Today we are able to travel all over the world, if we can afford the fares. Young people take gap years, other people are fortunate to go on

"round the world" cruises and we briefly experience all sorts of different cultures. We might try to learn a few useful phrases in other languages but unless we can truly converse in another language, we may be risking misunderstanding what is really being said.

Even when we are speaking in our own mother tongue there are times when we don't understand what we are being told. When language is highly technical or scientific or philosophical it may not really make much sense to those of us who are less academically inclined. Theology perhaps falls into this category. Basically, theology relates to thinking and talking about God and studying the Bible. Theos comes from the Greek meaning God and logos meaning word. Of course, many learned scholars have studied the Bible and the human response to reliaion and there is much that we can read and learn. However, at its most basic, theology is about finding God in our everyday lives, putting God first and following the teaching of Jesus,

Jesus gave us a basic commandment by which we can all live "Love God and love your neighbour as yourself." The whole world is our neighbour regardless of language, culture, or class.

How can we hope to make a difference? Listen to what people are saying and respect the different views they may have. Help those who need help and encourage and support those in need. Become a volunteer if you have a little free time and can afford to give it – you will probably make new friends in the process. Thank you to all those who already do so much for others but if you are wondering what you might do it is never too late to start. Ask around - you will soon find something to suit you, either within the church perhaps helping the Flower Club or joining the coffee rota or volunteering elsewhere to support one of the many active charities in the town.

The importance of Wonder Thought for the day broadcast 4th May 2024

This week I was amazed to hear about a wild Sumatran Orangutang in Indonesia treating a gaping wound - by chewing a medicinal leaf and carefully using its juice and leaves as a healing poultice. It's the first time a primate has been seen applying a plant in this way. Clearly, we have so much more to learn about them. We have also discovered 5000 new species deep in the Pacific Ocean - 90% completely new to scientists.

These stories fill me with wonder reminding me of Elisabeth Barret Browning's poem 'Aurora Leigh' where she writes:

> 'Earth is crammed with heaven, And every common bush afire with God: But only he who sees takes off his shoes.'

Recently I went on pilgrimage to an island in the middle of Derwentwater in the Lake District to find where my calling would take me next. In this exposed lone house, I found myself sheltering from storm Isha with booming 90mph winds and horizontal rain funnelling across the lake rattling our windows.

I huddled around a fire with a fellow pilgrim and discovered that he was from the Amazon. It was his first time in the UK and he had decided to travel the western world to tell us about mother earth so that we would stop destroying her. He told me his village were gathering thousands of healing medicinal plants for a walled garden, as most are on the verge of extinction, so they could be protected for generations to come.

He said 'first they came to our land with axes, then electronic saws, then large tractors with saws attached that can cut 200 trees per hour and 2 football pitches a day'. He said 'they don't understand that the earth is their lungs, their medicine, their body, their mother. Every man in those tractors is hurting their grandchildren.'

Late into the night, we shared our experience of wonder. I told him about William and Dorothy Wordsworth and their friend Coleridge, finding awe in the land around us; of Emily Bronte in Yorkshire writing 'Every leaf speaks bliss to me.' He showed me his colourful ritual feathers and explained plant medicine which helped him experience the Divine Mother who talks to him through forest trees.

At that time, I realised that wonder is not only about being inspired but also about being humble and willing to listen. As soon as we lose it, we are in danger of blind arrogance. I now realise that listening with wonder is the first step to having respect for the world around us. Only then, can we take off our shoes and collaborate.
